

2021-2022 7th Grade Summer Reading

Dear 7th Grade Students,

For your 2021-2022 summer reading assignment, you will read **two** books.

• **Book #1**: 7th-grade students will begin the 2021-2022 school year by reading a collection of poetry by a contemporary American poet. To build the skills needed to read poetry effectively, students will choose **one** of the following books. All of the books listed below have characters who develop and plots that progress; the only difference is that the novel is written in a poetic format called free verse¹. The only assignment for this book is to read it from start to finish and *enjoy* the experience. When they return to school in the fall, students will participate in book discussion groups.

• **Book #2**: students will peruse the "Middle School Suggested Independent Reading Titles" attached to the next two pages, and they will choose **one** piece of **fiction** from any of the lists. Your choice may be from any listed author, and your choice may be of any length. If you use the list from the Chester County library, make sure you use the "Middle School (6th, 7th & 8th)" or "Teen" list. If you use the themed list, be sure your choice is age-appropriate in terms of subject. Once you finish reading the book, students will write a **one-page** reaction to the book. What did you like? What did you dislike? What was interesting about the plot? What would you have changed? These are just some sample questions; feel free to answer some of your own making. Students will write their responses in double-spaced 11-point Times New Roman font. This write-up is due on the first day of class.

A Note for Parents: This assignment places value on choice: for the first assignment, students choose from a list of nine books, and the second assignment allows students to choose from hundreds of books. The suggested choices contain a wide range of themes, some of which include mature storylines and content. I would encourage students AND parents to make informed decisions about their choices for summer reading. Amazon provides synopses for books, and Common Sense Media gives overviews of books, noting potentially challenging material. If students and parents make choices together, each will be better informed about a book's content and will be better prepared to read a wide range of material.
